If you need help with anything please ask a neighbour or somebody “on the door”.

The words in normal type are for the worship leaders to say and the words in **bold** type for everybody to say.

## Notes for Worship Leaders

If this service is the only one on a Sunday, the readings should be the ones set as ‘Principal Service’ for the day in the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). The RCL is used by the Church of England and by several of the other major Christian denominations, including the Catholics. RCL readings are on a 3-year cycle and start on Advent Sunday each year: 2017/18 is year B, 2018/19 year C etc.

The RCL readings for each liturgical year are listed on pages 537 to 588 of the main Common Worship book. This can be confusing, however, and an easier way is the various diaries and booklets that are available listing the readings by actual date. <http://almanac.oremus.org/lectionary/> is an easy on-line way to get listings.

For a specific day use this example link for 5 November 2017:

<http://almanac.oremus.org/2017-11-05> and change the date to the one required, making sure that the numbers have leading zeros and that the dashes are minus symbols and not underscores.

The following are needed for Morning Prayer.

- Opening canticle: *from this booklet, selected for the current Church season.*
- Psalm(s): *listed in the lectionary, read from a Bible or Common Worship.*
- Old Testament canticle: *from this booklet, selected for the current Church season.*
- Scripture readings: *listed in the lectionary, read from a Bible.*
- A sermon or a suitable alternative.
- Prayers/intercessions.
- The Collect for the Day: *printed in Common Worship and also at the <http://almanac.oremus.org> links above.*

Members of the congregation could read the first two readings, as is the custom at a Eucharist, and the worship leader the Gospel. Another reader could lead the canticles and Psalm(s). If the Psalm is printed separately for the congregation all could say it together; or the worship leader or canticle reader could read it.

There are several possible ways to say the Gospel canticle (the Benedictus) and the other canticles. The reader could simply read the verses; or the reader could read odd verses and the congregation even ones; or the congregation could read all the words. This is for the worship leader to choose. In any case it is normal for the whole congregation to say the Gloria (‘Glory to the Father ...’) to conclude the canticles and Psalm(s).

I suggest that the prayers (intercessions) are led in exactly the same way as at a Eucharist, by a member of the congregation, and that the worship leader then says the Collect for the day and leads the Lord’s Prayer.

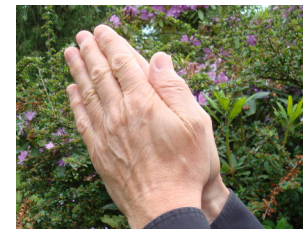
